

Dr. Henry Jaffe Dead At 82, Long a Leader On Ailments of Bones

Dr. Henry L. Jaffe, an authority on bone pathology, died Friday at the extended-care facility of New Rochelle Hospital, after a long illness. A resident of Pelham, N.Y., he was 82 years old.

Until his retirement in 1966, Dr. Jaffe was director of laboratories at the Hospital for Joint Diseases in New York City. He was also a visiting professor at the Albert Einstein College of Medicine and a consultant for the Navy and for the Armed Forces Institute of Pathology for many years.

Under his auspices, the laboratories of the Hospital for Joint Diseases became an internationally known center for bone pathology in which a number of classic bone diseases were discovered and studied.

For the discovery of osteoid osteoma, a benign tumor often confused with incurable cancer, Dr. Jaffe was chosen as Coronation Lecturer in 1953 by the British Orthopedic Association. At the same time, he was elected an honorary member of the Royal Society of Medicine.

Trainer of Many Surgeons

Dr. Jaffe was also an honorary member of the American Academy of Orthopedic Surgeons, the American Orthopedic Association, the Mexican Society of Orthopedics, the British Orthopedic Association and the New York Roentgen Society.

As a teacher, he trained many of the leading American orthopedic pathologists and surgeons. His lectures were cited as models of clarity and scholarship, and he was known for his encouragement and kindness toward his younger collaborators.

Dr. Jaffe was the author of two standard textbooks used in medical schools and as standard reference works on bone pathology: "Tumors and Tumorous Conditions of the Bones and Joints" and "Metabolic, Degenerative and Inflammatory Conditions of Bones and Joints."

He is survived by his wife, the former Clarissa Cross, and a son, Arthur.

Katharine Sturges Knight, at 88, An Illustrator of Books and Style
